

Sundaa Bridgett-Jones is a mission-driven executive recognized for shaping bold initiatives at the intersection of philanthropy, international affairs, and social impact. Most recently she served as Vice President for the Americas and Chief Partnerships Officer at The Global Energy Alliance for People and Planet (GEAPP), a platform launched at COP26 to accelerate clean energy transitions across Asia, Africa, and the Americas. A founding architect of the alliance, she cultivated global partnerships with leading philanthropies and raised more than \$650 million in capital commitments to expand renewable energy access and innovation.

Prior to GEAPP, Ms. Bridgett-Jones spent a decade at The Rockefeller Foundation where she was Vice President for Communications, Policy, and Advocacy. She directed global initiatives on climate resilience, pandemic response, and economic justice, and co-created the Global Resilience Partnership, building coalitions that influenced multilateral policy frameworks and scaled solutions for vulnerable communities.

Her earlier public service includes senior roles in U.S. foreign policy and multilateral institutions. At the U.S. Department of State, she helped launch the Open Government Partnership in collaboration with the White House and the Government of Brazil. At the United Nations, she managed c-suite operations in the Department of Political Affairs and designed preventive diplomacy strategies for South Asia. She began her career at USAID as a President Management Fellow, where she oversaw democracy and governance programs in more than 30 countries, and served as a Foreign Service Officer in Kazakhstan, Malawi, South Africa, and Iraq, including working with the Coalition Provisional Authority in Baghdad to establish Iraq's first Transitional National Assembly.

Ms. Bridgett-Jones is a Trustee of the University of Pittsburgh, a member of the Council on Foreign Relations, and advises several organizations including iMMAP and the Leadership Council on Women in National Security. She holds a master's degree in public and international affairs from the University of Pittsburgh and a bachelor's degree in international affairs and African studies from Georgetown University.
