Laura Trevelyan is an anchor and correspondent for the BBC's Emmy Award-winning newscast World News America. She covers national and international stories from the studio in Washington DC, and anchors breaking news on location, from Hurricane Florence hitting North Carolina to the house vote to impeach President Trump. As President Trump was diagnosed with coronavirus and in the tumultuous hours that followed, she was reporting live from Washington. During the coronavirus outbreak, she's reported from the hardest hit neighborhoods of New York on the pandemic's impact.

Trevelyan was the BBC's UN correspondent from 2006 to 2009. Prior to moving to New York in 2004, she was a political correspondent for BBC news in the United Kingdom, and began her BBC career reporting from Northern Ireland on the Good Friday agreement. She has reported on humanitarian and peacekeeping work in Haiti, Africa, Asia, the Middle East, and on many U.S. elections. She is the author of two books, *A Very British Family: The Trevelyans and Their World* and *The Winchester: The Gun That Built an American Dynasty*. Trevelyan earned a first class degree in politics from Bristol University and a postgraduate diploma in journalism from the University of Wales College, Cardiff.
