Marcela Guerrero is Assistant Curator at the Whitney Museum of American Art, New York. Recently, she was part of the curatorial team that organized *Vida Americana: Mexican Muralists Remake American Art*, 1925-1945. In summer 2018, Guerrero curated the exhibition *Pacha, Llaqta, Wasichay: Indigenous Space, Modern Architecture, New Art.* From 2014 to 2017 she worked as Curatorial Fellow at the Hammer Museum in Los Angeles, where she was involved in the much-lauded exhibition *Radical Women: Latin American Art*, 1960-1985, organized as part of the Getty Foundation's Pacific Standard Time: LA/LA initiative and guest-curated by Cecilia Fajardo-Hill and Andrea Giunta. Guerrero's writing has appeared in exhibition catalogues and in art journals such as *caa.reviews, ArtNexus, Caribbean Intransit: The Arts Journal, Gulf Coast: A Journal of Literature and Fine Arts, Interventions: International Journal of Postcolonial Studies*, and *Diálogo*. Born and raised in Puerto Rico, Guerrero holds a PhD in art history from the University of Wisconsin, Madison.
